Tihei Mōuri ora!




Firstly, it is only right that we greet those who have turned their faces to new horizons.

It is my honour again to address everyone as the Chair of the Whanganui Community Foundation and to report on the operations of the Foundation.

The 2020-2021 period has definitely been an interesting period for all of us, with the impacts of change across the region. Lately we have felt the impacts of lockdowns and variations on daily life throughout our region, but we have attempted to maintain the support we have provided through time.

TIMES OF CHANGE

Our Strategic Plan is under review but at this time; the strategic direction of the Foundation continues to be focussed upon creating meaningful change for all of our communities.

Our Community Support Grants continue to High Needs Children 0-5yrs, Youth at Risk, and Elderly in our Communities. Our Quick Response grants have continued to support programmes that strengthen our communities, and our other grants have enabled projects to continue across the region.

Our High Engagement Grant Programme has been suspended for the foreseeable future for new applications, pending review of our grants policy during 2021. Existing multi-year grants are unaffected by this change. Any changes to our grants policy during 2021 will be publicised on our website in due course.

Covid 19 played a major role in the workings of our communities which led to us to review how we might support organisations during the various periods of instability. This review enabled us to contemplate re-engaging our Covid 19 Grant initiative for the period. Although the Grants were not re-instituted, the capacity is there.





HIGHLIGHTS

We have been very fortunate to be able to support a number of our community organisations with funding that has allowed services to continue.

Quick Response Grants totalled \$224,998, up \$28,000 on the previous year, whilst Community Support Grants totalled \$302,500, up \$30,000 from 2020. In total we made 82 grants, up from 63 the previous year.

- Te Ahuru Mowai o Tutaeporoporo playground was supported by the Foundation and opened in Tutaenui - Marton. It has been a very popular site for the community with people from across the region travelling to the place and utilising the area;
- 2021 saw the final payment of our \$1,000,000 support to the Sarjeant Gallery; we look forward to this project being completed in the near future and watching this place become a centre of activity;
- Our financial position has been maintained despite the volatility of the markets. We must acknowledge the work done by our investment brokers, Craigs Investment Partners for their astute handling of our portfolios to ensure our level of income has not been impacted for grants.

 Although not a financial highlight, our (now former) trustee Suze Redmayne was appointed a Justice of the Peace, highlighting again the quality of the people we have on our Board;

Also, big thanks must also go to all of our staff and contractors who ensure that we can continue to support our community: Stephen Brandon (Manager), Michelle Goodwin (Office Admin); Douglas Wilson (Executive Admin and financial guru); and finally my fellow Trustees, without whom we could not do what we are doing.
