

Again it is my privilege as Chairman to report to everyone on the operations of the Whanganui Community Foundation.

The 2022-23 year has been one of continued restructuring of our approaches across various sectors and the community as a whole. Because our rohe or region extends from the Wahapū (river mouth) of both the Rangitikei and Whanganui Rivers to Paretetaitonga, one of the peaks of Ruapehu, we have continued to look for ways to support initiatives throughout our various communities.

PERSONNEL CHANGES

The past year has also been eventful for our Foundation with some of our members moving on to 'greener pastures'. We must acknowledge Jeff Whitlock, Michael Dewhirst and Douglas Wilson and thank them for their contributions. Other members have gone off to try their hands at different activities, and we wish them well. We welcome two new trustees in Kevin Ross and Mary Bennett, adding a depth to our board as we begin to move forward. We also welcomed in Brent Hood into the fold as our Kaitiaki Pūtea or Guardian of the Purse.

DIRECTIONS

With the changes taking place across the sector, so too changes have taken place in regards to our strategic direction as a foundation. We have continued our pledge to being 'Greener" in our support and this has led to the Foundation becoming a signatory to the Funders' Commitment on Climate Change. Another shift in philosophy is the recognition of the Tiriti o Waitangi and the partnerships envisaged and foreseen within this founding document. This shift has afforded us the opportunity to think seriously about our funding priorities. There was a brave decision made by members of the foundation to work towards ensuring that our support enables people and organisations to move forward into the future with notions of self-development, setting goals for self-sustainability. From this bravery emerged the notion that grants whereby people and organisations can be given a 'hand up' rather than a 'hand out' will be given priority, with a focus towards those people or organisations moving from a situation of seeking monies for the "next thing on the agenda" to "future planning and provision".

We have listened to the voices of the various communities across our rohe and identified five specific areas that will be the focus of our work and funding support for the next five years; they are:

- 1. Equitable outcomes
- 2. Funding the gap
- **3.** Community outcomes
- 4. Benefit to our community(ies)
- 5. Transformational change enhances wellbeing

Alongside these areas are specific criteria and foci that will be to the forefront of our work as we move forward into the future:

- 1.40% of funding will be devoted and earmarked to projects that engage with and empower whānau, hapū and iwi māori, including tauiwi and taura here;
- 2. Initiatives that involve 'Whole of Community';
- **3.** Initiatives that provide opportunities for employment or entrepreneurial development from within the Community.

There are new requirements to be introduced to all applicants that I am happy to announce here: What are the impacts their work is making in one of the following areas:

- 1. Active engagement with Whānau Māori and the local iwi in the Community? Actual participation statistics, not educated guesses;
- Active engagement with low socio-economic sectors of the Community; this includes those within the elderly community who are often overlooked;
- **3.**Reasons why Central Government cannot or will not pick up this area?

These new priorities will allow us to engage with and enable the Foundation to support the notions highlighted.

FINANCIAL POSITION

We have been very fortunate that our financial position has been maintained despite the market volatility over the past year. We acknowledge the work done by all our financial advisors and Accountants – Craigs Investment Partners and Spooner, Hood & Redpath Ltd for their astute handling of our portfolios to ensure our level of income has not been impacted for grants. Our grants for the year ended March 2023 totalled \$1,087,570 including pledges.






INVESTMENT INCOME DOWN FROM \$752.4K SURPLUS
